## Re: 100% Smoke-Free Policy for Bluesfest

Dear Mr. Monahan and Mr. Trépanier:

The Ottawa Council on Smoking or Health (OCSH) is a local volunteer organization established in 1978. Our goals are to: create a social environment where non-smoking is the norm; to assist in establishing smoke-free environments; to prevent youth from starting to smoke; to encourage smokers to quit; and to advocate for better smoking cessation resources.

We are writing to urge the National Capital Commission (NCC) and RBC Royal Bank Bluesfest Ottawa to adopt a 100% smoke-free policy, beginning in 2013, to protect all Bluesfest attendees, performers, workers and volunteers from second-hand smoke.

The OCSH advocated for the City of Ottawa's smoke-free outdoor bylaw which came into effect on April 2, 2012. We understand that Bluesfest is held on NCC property and therefore falls outside the jurisdiction of the City of Ottawa's smoke-free outdoor bylaw.

The OCSH continues to receive complaints from the public regarding exposure to second-hand smoke at Bluesfest. **Studies show that there is no safe level of exposure to second-hand smoke, even outdoors**. The 2010 U.S. Surgeon General Report states that second-hand smoke contains more than 7,000 chemicals, 69 of which are known to cause cancer. The toxic level of second-hand smoke can be as high as in a smoke-filled room and even brief exposures to second-hand smoke can pose serious health risks. Tobacco use is the leading cause of preventable disease and death in Ottawa. It costs \$40 million per year to treat Ottawa residents hospitalized for diseases related to smoking and exposure to second-hand smoke.

The OCSH commends Bluesfest for adopting strong health, accessibility and environmental policies to prevent volunteers from smoking while on duty, to assist patrons with disabilities by improving wheelchair accessibility, and to provide free supervised bicycle parking. We also commend the NCC and Bluesfest for ensuring that the Ottawa Folk Festival remains a 100% smoke-free event.

The OCSH urges Bluesfest to be even more progressive and to adopt a 100% smoke-free policy, beginning next year, to create a healthier, more accessible and more environmentally-friendly event. A 100% smoke-free policy would:

• Protect all Bluesfest workers, volunteers, performers and patrons, especially children under the age of 10 who are admitted free.

- Reduce the risk of breast cancer due to second-hand smoke exposure among young adult women<sup>5</sup> who attend and volunteer at Bluesfest.
- Ensure that Bluesfest is accessible to all members of the public, including individuals with asthma, Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), heart disease, cancer, and other chronic health conditions affected by second-hand smoke.
- Enjoy widespread support from the public and tourists.<sup>6</sup>
- Create positive role modeling for children and youth. Smoke-free environments
  help to prevent youth from starting to smoke and encourage individuals who have
  quit to stay smoke-free.
- Enhance Bluesfest's reputation as an environmentally friendly event by eliminating pollution from toxic, non-biodegradable cigarette butt litter, especially given the festival's proximity to the Ottawa River. Cigarette butts are the number one form of litter recovered along beaches and shorelines in Canada. Cigarette butts pose a risk to our drinking water supply because wind and rain

carry butts into street drains and local waterways. <sup>9</sup> Cigarette butts also pose a risk to birds, fish and other wildlife. <sup>10</sup>

- Catch up to other festivals and major events in Ottawa that have already adopted a 100% smoke-free policy (*e.g.* HOPE Volleyball Summerfest, TD Ottawa Jazz Festival, Ottawa International Children's Festival, Tim Hortons Ottawa Dragon Boat Festival) and help to create a level playing field among all local festivals.
- Enhance the NCC's Environmental Strategy. 11
- Enhance RBC's Corporate Sponsorship Program, which focuses on making "a
  positive social impact in the communities we serve," and which supports
  programs that foster "a culture of water stewardship," children's mental health,
  and sports. 12 All of these programs are in keeping with smoke-free living and
  smoke-free environments.
- Reduce the risk of outdoor fires during drought-stricken summers, as the City of Ottawa experienced in 2012.

The OCSH would be pleased to meet with the NCC and Bluesfest to discuss this important public health initiative and to lend our support for the adoption and implementation of a 100% smoke-free policy beginning in 2013.
